You'll complete all your classes online except for two one-week doctoral residencies you will do in person during your first two summers in the program. Program prerequisites

- 62 and 66-credit options
 - Hold a master's degree from an accredited institution with a cumulative graduate GPA of 3.0 or higher
- 42-credit option
 - Hold a certificate of advanced studies,
 Education Specialist (Ed.S.) or Sixth
 Year Degree

Admissions requirements

- Free application at bridgeport.edu/apply
- Official transcripts from last degree earned
 - International transcripts must include an official course-by-course evaluation of all academic work from naces.org.
- Two letters of recommendation
 - Provide one letter from a colleague and one letter from a supervisor that attests to your demonstrated leadership, your potential for further leadership, and your ability to benefit from doctoral study.
- Personal statement
 - In 500 words or more, detail the following:
 - Your reasons for wanting to undertake doctoral studies
 - Your most significant personal and professional accomplishments
 - The extent to which your personal and professional responsibilities will allow you to devote the necessary time and effort to the program
 - A detailed description of your potential research topic
- Writing sample
 - Your writing sample may be your master's thesis, a published or submitted journal article, a scholarly paper, or a document you created for your institution.
- Official TOEFL scores
 - For applicants whose native language is not English
